





Designated Staff Members Working on ADA Inclusion

All Organizations with a Designated Staff Person Who Addresses ADA Needs



- Across all organizational categories: 59% have a designated staff person
 - Park Districts: recreation supervisors
 - Other organizations: titles vary widely
- 86% of organizations with a designated staff person expressed interest in connecting with each other

Policies and Procedures

- Libraries refer to IL Library Association's ADA Standards
- Municipalities refer to IL ADA Code, IL Building code, zoning requirements
- Some communities have conducted Accessibility Audits and greated ADA Transition Plans
 - Orland Park, Schaumburg, Grayslake Park Dist, Rolling Meadows Park Dist, Evanston, Carol Stream, McHenry County Conservation Dist (7)
- Schools: students w.disabilities receive an Individualized Education Program
- City Colleges of Chicago: Disability Access Centers

Programs

- Provide accommodations and programs geared towards disability topics
- Staff disability awareness training
- American Sign Language Interpreters available for meetings

Housing:

Local policies, procedures, & programs



(WRCDC)

- Many communities work collaboratively with non-profit groups and private organizations to meet housing needs
 - Northwest Housing Partnership has extended the Handyman program to include person's with disabilities (Indic. by Arlington Heights, Mount Prospect)

Building Plans

- Schaumburg: Village's 5-Year Consolidated Plan addresses future supportive housing needs
- Villa Park: Reviews building plans and inspects new construction for ADA compliance

- Subsidized Housing: 6 communities
 - Mount Prospect: Meyer's Place subsidized housing unit for p.w.disabilities
 - Wilmette: Housing Assistance Program which provides financial support to persons with disabilities who meet certain income guidelines
 - Lakewood: Partnered with Pioneer Center to create group home for young adults with special needs.
 - Lakewood: TIF District has \$1M set aside for housing for young adults with special needs. Contributes to portfolio of affordable housing stock required by the state.
- Non-Profit Program: Open Communities (formerly "Interfaith Housing Center of the Northern Suburbs")

Policies

- Equal opportunity employer / employ p.w.disabilities
- Make accommodations ex. flexible schedules
- Municipal Programs: Arlington Heights Citizen Commission
 - 2009: Created Annual Employer Award for a local business recognized has an inclusive employer
 - 2014: Released "Business Information Packet" as a resource to hiring and employing persons with disabilities
- Library Programs: Skokie Public Library collaborates with local high schools to offer transitional work experience
- Non-Profit Programs
 - Center for Independent Futures
 - Jjs List (also an ADA25 partner)
 - Valley Sheltered Workshop, Batavia
 - No Boundaries, Evanston

- PACE Dial-A-Bus paratransit services (12 surveys)
- Taxi subsidy program (5 municipalities: Arlington Heights, Woodridge, Schaumburg, Villa Park, Downers Grove)

- Van programs for some schools and park districts
- Metra Free Ride application assistance provided by Mount Prospect

Technologies Used

- Internet-related technologies (19 surveys)
 - Online chat, ADA compatible websites, adaptable font sizes, etc.
- Hardware: adapted keyboards, magnifying machines
- TTY/TDD phones, Closed Captioning
- Hearing assistance for public meetings (6 surveys)
- iPads and online chat to facilitate non-verbal communication when needed

Programs

- IL Talking Books Outreach Center
- Foss Park District: working towards portable computer lab to assist p.w.disabilities with computer skills.

Innovative Outreach Initiatives & Collaborative Efforts

- School/Library Collaboration: e.g. Glen Ellyn Library
- Rolling Meadows Park District: Ability Awareness Day at day camps & preschool
- Veterans Park District (Northlake): Free special recreation carnival and encourage participation from both special needs and non-special needs families
- Glen Ellyn Public Library: homebound delivery for library materials
- Carol Stream: Police Department's Social Service Unit
 - Community outreach to underprivileged families
 - Referral service, diagnostic consultation, crisis intervention, counseling

Innovative Outreach Initiatives & Collaborative Efforts

- Skokie Public Library:
 - Dog Therapy for children with disabilities
 - Inclusive Teen Social Group
 - Specific volunteer opportunities for p.w.disabilities
 - Music demonstration classes, in collab. With pediatric therapy centers
 - Displaying artwork from Douglass Center for ADA25 event in October
- Evanston Library: Hosted Special Needs Family Resource Fair
- Glen Ellyn Library: Participates in the Targeting Autism Forum, a state program to connects libraries with other community stakeholder organizations; educates about providing inclusive services
- Itasca Library: Participates in Light It Up Blue, worldwide autism awareness event
- Wilmington: School students w.disabilities work shadowing program
- Will-Grundy Center for Independent Living
 - Teach HS students w.disabilities about their rights
 - Work with non-profit organizations to educate on disability-related laws.
- Foss Park District: Hosting a Baseball Clinic for kids with all abilities for all over Lake County on July 25

Innovative Outreach Initiatives & Collaborative Efforts

Townships

- Provide bus transportation, as well as information about transportation services
- Wheeling Township: Advisory council for person's with disabilities.
- Ela Township: Social worker who provides resources

Special Recreation Associations (32 in Illinois)

- Collaborative agreement among park districts, cities and villages to provide recreation and leisure opportunities for p.with disabilities.
- Also provide education opportunities to children and adults on community inclusion
- Staff: Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialists, Program Specialists, Parks and Rec
- Palatine Park Dist: Portion of our annual tax levy goes to be a member and serve the residents of our jurisdiction

Community Needs

Identified in Survey Responses

- Take advantage of new technology, and assistance with implementing current technology
- Better identify what needs exist
- Better access to public transportation
- Affordable wheelchair-accessible taxicab service
- Equipment needs
- Crosswalk technical assistance and visually impaired technology, esp. near senior centers and in downtown areas
- Technical assistance in ADA inclusion urban/park planning (Blue Island, Foss Park District)
- Library staff training in "Universal Design Learning"

Big Picture Trends

- Ample examples of innovative collaboration
- Identified both success stories and gaps in service
- Desire to do more
- Interested in connecting more with each other
 - Challenge: wide variety of staff titles
