Environmental Justice Leadership

- ➤ IL Environmental Justice Commission composition 14 members
- Seats "4 members of affected communities concerned with environmental justice"
 - Current members one representing Waukegan Township)
 - three (presumably) represent Chicago"
- Seat "units of local government"
 - Current member MWRD Commissioner

Environmental Justice Leadership

➤ White House Environmental Justice Advisory Council

MMC & SSMMA nominated Mayor Vernard Alsberry, Hazel Crest

► Low Income Energy Efficiency Advisory Committee (Income Qualified "North")

(advises investments of \$500/million year)

Leadership Team

recent election diversified to add regional and municipal representatives

Advocacy

➤ EJ organizations and "community based organizations" (CBO) are empowered in EJ legislation and policy

OIn CEJA "community based organizations" are empowered

The definition from Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA) is: "Community-based organizations" means an organization that: (1) provides employment, skill development, or related services to members of the community; (2) includes community colleges, nonprofits, and local governments; (3) has at least one main operating office in the community or region it serves; and (4) demonstrates relationships with local residents and other organizations serving the community.

Statute

CEJA narrowly defined environmental justice communities (EJC)

Funding and investments are guided by this definition

- ➤ Now in ILGA:
- O2 Bills amending Environmental Protection Act regarding designation as EJC
- OBill to establish Justice 40 oversight

Opportunities and Solutions for EJC

EJC's will be preferred for investments in:


- Clean energy


