Air pollution comes from many sources both near and far. We can recognize "point source" pollution as the type that emanates from industrial processes and smokestacks. But pollution sources within our communities come from a wide range of activities including all engines, appliances, combustion, and some common chemicals. Pollutants cross political boundaries, contribute to ground-level ozone, and cause public health impacts.

The Clean Air Act of 1970 authorizes the U.S. EPA to regulate air emissions and establish National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) through state-level implementation plans. Yet, there are opportunities for local government policies and programs to improve regional air quality.

LADCO membership includes state air agencies for Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin.
